OFFER OF EARLY HELP

Definition: "Providing early help is more effective in promoting the welfare of children than reacting later. Early help means providing support as soon as a problem emerges, at any point in a child's life, from foundation years through to teenage years"

Working Together to Safeguard children, DfE, June 18

Our Early Help Offer identifies the need to help our children and families as soon as a problem starts to emerge, or when there is a strong likelihood that problems will develop in the future. All staff must be aware of the offer of early help. At all times staff should consider if there is any offer of early help that we can make in order to help a child to thrive. Early help is an approach not necessarily an action. It includes prevention education as well as intervention where necessary or appropriate. In some cases immediate urgent action might be necessary if a child or young person is at risk of immediate harm.

The Gloucestershire Early Help and Targeted Support Service is made up of local teams of professionals who deliver practical advice and support to children, young people and their families. Within Gloucestershire the Early Help Partnership is co-ordinated by Families First Plus but all organisations working with children and young people should view themselves as part of the early help partnership. At all times all staff should consider if there is any offer of early help that we can make in order to help a child thrive. The GSCB 'continuum of need' windscreen is an important diagram to keep in mind for all children.

If you have some concerns a good starting point is to come and talk to the Head Teacher, Mrs Jones, who can on your behalf, make a referral on a CAF (common referral form) Gloucestershire Early Help and Targeted Support Team. If your child is pre-school age GPs, health visitors and children's centre staff all know about the Early Help Service and can help make a referral if that is what you think would help.

Our approach is to work closely with families and to hold a Team Around The Child (TAC) or Team around the Family (TAF) meeting so that everyone is clear about what we are trying to achieve and who is doing what.

Before we can start to work with your family we need your consent. Our service is confidential and you will be asked for permission for us to speak with other relevant professionals on your behalf.
